Residency Programs: The Health System Pharmacy Administration and Leadership PGY2 Residency Program is a one-year residency established to provide specialty training for residents interested in health-system pharmacy administration. The PGY2 programs at Rush include critical care, emergency medicine, hematology/oncology, internal medicine, pediatrics and solid organ transplant.

Purpose Statement: PGY2 pharmacy residency programs build on Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.) education and PGY1 pharmacy residency programs to contribute to the development of clinical pharmacists in specialized areas of practice. PGY2 residencies provide residents with opportunities to function independently as practitioners by conceptualizing and integrating accumulated experience and knowledge and incorporating both into the provision of patient care or other advanced practice settings. Residents who successfully complete an accredited PGY2 pharmacy residency are prepared for advanced patient care, academic, or other specialized positions, along with board certification, if available.

Mission Statement: The mission of the Rush PGY2 Health-System Pharmacy Administration and Leadership Pharmacy Residency (HSPAL) is to graduate compassionate pharmacy leaders who excel as both clinicians and leaders. The Health-System Pharmacy Administration and Leadership Residency at Rush University Medical Center will provide the resident with a well-rounded experience and is designed to develop the resident's leadership expertise in managing a pharmacy department through a variety of core and elective rotations. Additionally, residents will have opportunities to gain experience in teaching, research and quality improvement.

Administration Experience: The PGY2 resident will have the opportunity to participate in organizational leadership in an academic teaching environment. The resident's foundation in pharmacy leadership will be developed through leadership in a pharmacy department that manages a 32-million-dollar annual drug budget with almost 4 million inpatient doses dispensed annually. Rush University Medical Center encompasses a 664-bed hospital serving both adults and children. The PGY2 HSPAL resident will have the opportunity to manage a system-wide project.

Research Experience: The PGY2 resident will be expected to complete a longitudinal leadership project suitable for publication in collaboration with an experienced preceptor. The project will be a Department or Hospital Quality Improvement/Performance Improvement initiative. The project will be presented at a regional residency conference in and/or other pharmacy conference.

Teaching Experience: The PGY2 resident will serve as a preceptor for Doctor of Pharmacy students from local colleges of pharmacy. The resident will also lead organized group discussions with pharmacy students and PGY1 residents. There may be opportunities to lecture at local colleges of pharmacy.

Staffing Experience: The resident will be responsible for staffing every fourth weekend, 1 major and 1 minor holiday as the pharmacist-in-charge. The resident will staff one weekday evening shift every other week.

Pharmacy Administrator on Call: The resident will be expected to rotate through alongside other pharmacy leaders in covering the pharmacy administrator on call pager Monday-Friday. Responsibilities during call include, but are not limited to, participating in Hospital Incident Command, reviewing non-formulary medication requests, managing operational/staffing efficiencies and regulatory monitoring.
